Flexibility is the key to Kamloops Photo Arts Club's weekly Wednesday night meetings. April 2/14 is one such example when the Club eschewed their usual meeting place at Henry Grube Education Centre for the 'theatre-in-the-round' setting of Thompson Rivers University's Brown Family's 'House of Learning'. This Gathering House, reminiscent of the Salish People's pit-house, seats up to 350 people in tiers under its log roof of beetle-killed wood topped with sod and solar panels. The \$32-million dollar building features a 'Living Wall' in its atrium that filters air for the 78,000 sq. foot building housing diverse study, library and office space. The building is worth a photographers visit just on its own.

The draw to gather at TRU was Victoria, BC, Wildlife Photographer and Biologist, Jared Hobbs [www.hobbsphotos.com](http://www.hobbsphotos.com). Hobbs was speaking on behalf of the Nature Conservancy of BC & Canada in their fundraising quest to protect and manage thousands of acres of grasslands, a threatened eco-system, in the Kamloops area. The purchase of the Napier Lake Ranch 25 km south of Kamloops on Hwy 5A will keep a large tract of grassland intact in perpetuity. Grasslands make up about 1% of BC's lands but are home to 30% of the province's endangered species – sharp tailed grouse, long-billed curlews and migrating cranes.

The grasslands are a favourite haunt of KPAC photographers. Many are also Conservancy members so were glad they didn't have to choose between this special event with Lieutenant Governor, Her Honour Judy Guichon, a ranching neighbour of Napier Lake, giving the opening address, and a KPAC meeting. Jared Hobbs passion for his subject came through beautifully in his photos and comments. A bit of networking took place during the reception with KPAC's award winning nature photo-graphers being introduced to the Nature Conservancy's chief organizer for BC.
